+ God's Draft Choices +

Two of the most highly watched sporting events on television this past spring were not when teams or athletes are competing against each other; rather they involve the drafting of players for the National Football League (NFL) and National Basketball Association (NBA) teams. For many hours, fans of professional sports will watch intently to see whom their favorite teams will draft.

Most of us won't be drafted by professional football or basketball teams, but, as Christians, we receive a greater calling. We, in essence, are God's draft choices. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit" (John 15:16). God has made us a part of His team. We are not chosen by God because we are successful in our careers, great athletes, or wealthy. God chooses ordinary people to do extra-ordinary things. "But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. He chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are " (1 Corinthians 1:27-28).

Through faith, we understand that we are among the foolish and weak through whom God carries on his life-saving work. "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all surpassing power is from God and not from us" (2 Corinthians 4:7). God entrusts us—clay jars—with this treasure—the Gospel. Even though we are frail and unworthy of our tasks, God has chosen us to carry His message of love to the world. As humble people of faith, we are empowered by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. He transforms and molds us. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5:17). It is God Who does the drafting and the changing. Through faith, we will stay on God's team, and we will bear the fruit that He calls us to bear.

The professional athletes who are drafted are expected to perform. They are paid large sums of money to do very athletic things. As God's chosen people, we may not receive large compensation, but our benefits are out of this world! Therefore, we are eager to use our lives and resources in God's service for His glory. Paul wrote, "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Ephesians 2; 10). What a privilege it is to be part of and serving on God's winning team!

Testing your Knowledge of Scripture

Do you know who in Scripture gave some land for the work of the Lord?



If you said Barnabas, you were right. In Acts 4:36-37 we read, "Joseph, a Levite from Cyprus, whom the apostles called Barnabas (which means Son of Encouragement), sold a field he owned and brought the money and put it at the apostles' feet." In the early church, there were no

needy people because no one claimed that any of his possessions were his own. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, they shared with one another. Those with plenty gave to those in need. Barnabas willingly gave the land he owned for the work of the apostles.

With God's help, you, too, can give freely and generously of the blessings God has entrusted to you.

Tithing is not a gimmick to solve the economic problems of churches; it is a significant act of remembering who we are.

"Not to Be Served but to Serve"

The words of Matthew 20:28 - "Just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many" - remind us that the life of Jesus was one of total sacrifice. It is clear that Jesus expects His followers to have the same servant spirit heart as their Master. He said in Matthew 20:26, "...whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant." He lived for His heavenly Father and for others. Just as Jesus served His Father, we exist to serve Him. Being conformed into the image of Christ we will take on the role of servants as He did.

The concept of serving rather than being served is not a natural one. We have an inborn desire to want to be served ourselves and to have our own needs met rather than to see to others. We, by nature, prefer to be "number one." In addition, our apathy contributes to our lack of interest in serving.

We are too wrapped up in ourselves even to notice the needs of others. Through His Word and Sacraments, God gives us a new perspective. He enables us to see others as our brothers and sisters in Christ and gives us the desire to follow His command to love our neighbor as ourselves (Mark 12:31).

A life of service and servanthood is contrary to what our society promotes. We are told that we should aspire to fame, power, and wealth. Servants receive no glory, spotlight, or fame, but a meaningful relationship with Christ is not possible if we put ourselves first and seek only the goals that are important to the world we live in. Living a life of service, we give of ourselves without striving for financial rewards or glory. Unlike the praise we receive from God, worldly praise has no lasting value. Along with the Apostle Paul we say, "We are not trying to please men but God, Who tests our hearts" (1 Thessalonians 2:4). As a servant, Jesus was not looking for praise from the masses, because He was interested in glorifying His Father.

Second Corinthians 12:15 says, "So I will gladly spend for you everything I have and expend myself as well." Because of our desire to serve Jesus, we begin to identify

with the interest that He has in other people's lives. We forego our interests and begin to live a life of Christian service. "You, my brothers, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the sinful nature; rather, serve one another in love" (Galatians 5:13).



Our freedom expresses itself in the form of service. God brings us into a proper relationship with Himself so He can show us how to serve others. Jesus continually served the hungry, handicapped, and homeless, and we are called to be imitators of Christ (Ephesians 5:1). When we commit to serving others, it is not done for our own satisfaction or to put ourselves on a pedestal. We serve out of love for Christ and to be worthy of His calling.

Monona Lutheran Church's Endowment Fund

Monona Lutheran Church's Endowment Fund was created to establish a source of income for unusual needs within the church, its members, its community, and within the larger church body. Requests may include things like programs within the congregation, church worker scholarships, local ministries, and church facilities and expansion, among other needs. The money available to fund those requests comes from the earnings of the Endowment Fund, not its principle, meaning that donations to the fund are invested and the returns on those investments, not the donations themselves, are what are used to fund any disbursements.

So what has the Endowment Fund been used for in the past? Over the past several years, disbursements have been made for things like helping fund the Orphan Grain Train and Lutheran Disaster Relief, and to purchase an AED, large print hymnals, and pads and table cloths for the bell choir tables. In 2024, disbursements were made from the fund to pay for a new organ PC (\$4,018 - yes the organ runs from a computer – see Corey's article in the April Messenger) and the Generis program (\$2,700 – one of the facilitators for churches in harmony).

So how much is in the fund, how much is being contributed, and how much is being spent? As of the end of March 2025, the Endowment Fund's balance was \$217, 251. Contributions to the fund were \$2,850 in 2024 and the fund made requested disbursements of \$6,718 (these disbursements were from fund earnings in both 2023 and 2024).
