+ Whom Are You Looking At? +

The disciples were thrilled. They had their Lord back in their presence once again. Since His Resurrection, He had appeared to them and others several times. They were still a little confused, though, when He talked about "wait[ing] for the gift [His] Father promised" (Acts 1:5), and, then, "He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid Him from their sight" (Acts 1:9).

You can imagine their bewilderment. He had died and been buried and then had risen from the dead! He had walked among them and taught them again, and now. He is taken up into the clouds. No wonder they stood there — probably with mouths agape — looking into the sky where they had last seen Him.

It took "two men dressed in white" (Acts 1:10) to bring them back to their senses...
'Men of Galilee, ' "they said, 'why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, Who has been taken from you into Heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen Him go into Heaven ' " (Acts 1: 11).

Back they went to Jerusalem. Their eyes were no longer on the clouds, but they were still looking at Jesus. They waited. They prayed. They chose another disciple. And they waited some more — all the while looking at Jesus.

Whom are you looking at? Yes, Jesus has ascended. We can only imagine His joyful, triumphant return as all the hosts of Heaven welcomed back the risen, victorious Savior. Because He is that Savior, because He is the Author and perfecter of our faith, "let us fir our eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 122). Through His Word and Sacraments, He will lead us in His ways; He will teach us obedience and self-sacrifice; He will teach us love for our neighbors. With joyful and generous hearts, we celebrate the new life that Easter brings us by sharing the message of the Cross and the Empty Tomb with all who will listen. Keep looking at Jesus until in Heaven, you see him face to face!

Why Join a Bible Study?



Give What You Have

In the time of Jesus, one's animals were among the most important assets for survival. They were a means of transportation, hauled things, and provided food and clothing.

In Luke chapter 19, we find Jesus about to make His triumphal entry into Jerusalem. He tells two of His disciples. "Go into the village in front of you, where on entering you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever yet sat. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' you shall say this: 'The Lord has need of it.1" (verse 30). The disciples did as Jesus requested. The owner of the colt was



caught by surprise when the two disciples were untying his animal. The owner asked, "'Why are you untying the colt?' And they said, 'The Lord has need of it" (vs. 34).

Given this scenario, the owner acted like a true faithful steward. To begin with, we are called to care for all the Lord has given to us just as the owner cared for his colt. Yet we are also called to be ready at any time to give away what we have when the Lord needs what we have. All that we have is to be in this constant state of readiness to be used in the kingdom of God.

Just as the owner of the colt felt joy in providing the Lord with possibly his most prized possession, his colt, we can also feel that same joy as we use our resources to further the kingdom.

Your "Stuff" Will not Last

It was not that long ago when people had a lot less "stuff," maybe only one car, one TV, and a lot fewer appliances in the kitchen. We work hard, we are busy, and we have come to believe we need all these things. Our appetite for things has grown. There is nothing necessarily wrong with these things, but the Bible warns us that the love of money and "stuff" prompts us to wander from our faith (1Timothy 6:10).

The "stuff" we own will not last because we know they can be taken away from us. Things rust, get stolen, break, or become obsolete. Through faith, we will be with God forever, and we will not even miss what we owned on earth.

Handle with Care

We have all received fragile items in boxes that are marked "Handle with Care." In some ways, the gifts we receive as stewards from God should be marked with the words "Handle with Care." Shouldn't we handle our blessings such as abilities, money, time, physical health, and relationships with utmost care?
