May our Lord help each of us to ponder and appreciate this important aspect of our LIFE TOGETHER in Christ. May we especially join together in preparing to celebrate the Lord's death and resurrection with each offering of the Sacrament, and in the weekly celebration each Lord's day.

So, have a good, safe and enjoyable summer. But as you make plans to "get away from it all," please don't get away from your Savior. You can't afford to.

Becoming Workers in the Harvest

Jesus knows we are sheep who need a shepherd. He came to be that shepherd, the shepherd who laid down His life for us, His sheep (John 10:11). During His life on earth, He went through out all the cities and villages...Then He said to His disciples, "*The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest*" (Matthew 9:35-38).

God invites all of us to be His workers in the harvest field. He does not need us, but He gives us the privilege to be involved in this very important work. God has called us and chosen to work through us. What we can offer is our time and our talents. In Christ, we can do work that will be blessed into eternity. As Apostle Paul wrote, "I can do all things through Him strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). So can we.



God Uses Jars of Clay

The Apostle Paul refers to himself, the people in Corinth, and us as "jars of clay." "But we have this treasure in jars of clay..." (2 Corinthians 4:7). While every jar has its weaknesses and flaws, God has chosen to deliver His eternal gifts to this world through such vessels (you and me). He may have to break and remake us from time to time but use us He will—with our cooperation and obedience. He only requires that we gratefully submit our bodies and wills for His use and consecrate our efforts and energies for His purposes.

Of course, we will have problems. There will be times when we will be clobbered by conflict, even flattened in despair. It is quite possible that we may have to sacrifice status, popularity, even old friends, if we dare to let God have His way with us. Whatever we lose, however, we will regain a *"hundredfold"* (Matthew 19:29) in this life or in the next. This is the promise of our God.

The truth is that we do not have to be discouraged—not for long. We can even be free from the fear of failure. Only then are we truly free to live or die—to spend and expend our lives joyfully for Jesus' sake.

Monona Lutheran Church's Endowment Fund

Monona Lutheran Church's Endowment Fund was created to establish a source of income for unusual needs within the church, its members, its community, and within the larger church body. Requests may include things like programs within the congregation, church worker scholarships, local ministries, and church facilities and expansion, among other needs. The money available to fund those requests comes from the earnings of the Endowment Fund, not its principle, meaning that donations to the fund are invested and the returns on those investments, not the donations themselves, are what are used to fund any disbursements.

So what has the Endowment Fund been used for in the past? Over the past several years, disbursements have been made for things like helping fund the Orphan Grain Train and Lutheran Disaster Relief, and to purchase an AED, large print hymnals, and pads and table cloths for the bell choir tables. In 2024, disbursements were made from the fund to pay for a new organ PC (\$4,018 - yes the organ runs from a computer – see Corey's article in the April Messenger) and the Generis program (\$2,700 - one of the facilitators for churches in harmony).

So how much is in the fund, how much is being contributed, and how much is being spent? As of the end of March 2025, the Endowment Fund's balance was \$217, 251. Contributions to the fund were \$2,850 in 2024 and the fund made requested disbursements of \$6,718 (these disbursements were from fund earnings in both 2023 and 2024). Please direct any questions regarding the fund's investment details to Mike Simon or Dave Krivanek.
